Data Spotlight One in seven (14%) American Indian and Alaska Native peoples diagnosed with dementia are between the ages of 45 and 64 — known as younger-onset dementia — according to a new analysis. The study examined data from the Indian Health Service (IHS) National

service Medicare and Medicare Advantage, providing the most complete picture to date of

dementia diagnoses among Medicare beneficiaries. The tool can help public health

officials understand the growing Alzheimer's crisis, where those diagnosed with dementia

live, and where services and supports need to be targeted. According to the DataHub and article published in JAMA Network Open, in 2020, 5.5 million Medicare beneficiaries had diagnostic evidence of highly likely or likely dementia. An additional 2.6 million people had diagnostic evidence of possible dementia. This data does not include those with undiagnosed dementia, which NORC notes could be as much as 60% of people with dementia.
